TRICK OR TREAT

If you open your door on Halloween to Batman, a small Goblin, Superman or a Witch or any other oddly dressed character yelling trick or treat, chances are it is local children out trick or treating. This has been a regular occurrence on the 31st October since the late 1920s in America and around the 1980s in Australia. Would it surprise you to know that the origins go back a lot further than that? All the way back to the Celtic festival of Samhain in fact, this was held on the 31st October - 1st November to mark the beginning of winter. The Celts believed that on that night the souls of the dead came into our earthly world to be appeased with gifts of food and drink. It was believed that impersonating the souls of the dead and receiving offerings brought good fortune and protection from the spirits.

Poor people in Middle Ages Britain and Ireland would go "Souling" on the first of November, this was going from door to door and asking for food in return for saying prayers for the dead on All Souls Day

(November 2nd). "Guising", the custom of wearing costumes, masks and other forms of disguise began in Scotland in the late 19th century. This was a belief that by dressing like evil spirits it prevented them from doing harm, they carried lanterns made of hollowed out turnips and would ask at various homes for treats, such as fruit, cakes or money.

Immigrants brought these customs to North America and now it appears to be a world-wide phenomenon and certainly big business for the Confectionary and Costume makers. Halloween colours are green, orange, grey and black, symbols include black cats, bats and spiders, popular costumes include ghosts, skeletons, witches and wizards.

It is traditional to leave a pumpkin or Halloween decoration outside if you wish to reward the trick or treaters or simply leave your offerings at the door for your scary visitors, otherwise risk a trick, it's up to you!

So it's a hot summer's day, and I'm hitchhiking from Melbourne down to Geelong, to meet up with some friends, I'm hot, thirsty, and getting agro, cos I've walked a couple of kilometres, and despite heavy traffic, nobody has picked me up until... ahh thank goodness, a green Torana slows down, and stops right next to me.

I get in, gushing my appreciation, driver is a guy about 25 years old, nice bloke, good looking guy, sort of guy that would be 'popular', easy to like, we do the usual 'hot day 'ey'. I spill my woe about nobody picks up hitchhikers any more, and off we go.... slowly.... here's me, hanging to get to my friends, and my good Samaritan is driving in the slow lane, on a freeway at 80kms an hour. After about 5 minutes, I can't hold it in any longer, I say "You don't drive very fast mate" There is a silence for maybe 10

CAPSICUMS

Capsicums are exotic looking, smooth skinned with attractive jewel colours and have a distinctive flavour that most of us love.

The species are a genus of flowering plant from the nightshade family *Solanaceae* and are native to South and Central America where they have been cultivated for thousands of years. Australia, New Zealand, Singapore and India refer to them as capsicum but they are known as bell peppers in North America and the United Kingdom. The green variety is actually the immature state of *C.annuum*, they can be yellow, orange and red when ripe.

Peru is thought to have the highest cultivated Capsicum diversity with five varieties sold in markets, Bolivia consumes the largest amounts of wild peppers. Capsicums can be used in salads, baked and stuffed dishes, stews, stir fries, salsas and pizzas making them a very versatile ingredient in the kitchen. They can be grown in the south west providing they are grown through the warmer months. They need warm conditions over five months to produce the highest yields. Prepare the ground by digging in plenty of compost and animal manure to the depth of a shovel to create a light fluffy soil. Plant them in furrows about 30 – 40 centimetres apart, once they grow and start to bear fruit, they made need staking and protection from the sun if the temperature reaches the high thirties. Water regularly and add a little seaweed emulsion to the water to give them a boost and they will reward you with a bumper crop. There are many varieties to choose from, it is up to you.

Capsicums are an excellent source of Vitamins A and C (red contains more antioxidants. They are also a good source of dietary fibre, vitamin E, B6 and folate.


STOVE TOP CASSEROLE

Ingredients: 6 pork sausages, a tablespoon olive oil, 100g chopped bacon, 1 large onion thinly sliced, ½ red capsicum thinly sliced, 1 clove garlic minced, 1 x 400g diced tomatoes, 1 x 400g Cannellini Beans, I teaspoon Italian seasoning dried herbs, salt and pepper.

Method: Heat the oil in a wide base pan add sausages, cook, turning often until lightly browned (about 5 minutes) remove from the pan and place on a chopping board. Add onion, capsicum, bacon and garlic to pan and cook for about 5 minutes, stirring often. Cut the sausages into 4 chunks and return to pan, then add beans, tomatoes and herbs. Add about 150 ml water and bring pan to a gentle simmer. Place lid on pan and simmer for about 30-35 minutes stirring occasionally, if sauce thickens too much add a little water. Season to taste.

Served with a slice of sourdough to mop up the sauce, this makes a hearty filling meal, perfect for spring days that somehow feel a lot like winter is still here!

GREAT AUSSIE BIRD COUNT

Bird Life Australia are celebrating their 10th year with the Great Aussie Bird Count for 2023 which will be held on the 16th to 22nd October.

BirdLife Australia has been a leader in bird conservation for more than a century. One of their most popular initiatives is the annual bird count, which takes place across the country each October during National Bird Week. It doesn't matter if you are a newcomer or a twitcher, your contribution collects valuable data on species diversity and distribution which BirdLife Australia uses to monitor birds to ascertain which species are thriving or declining.

Nearly four million birds were counted in 2022, the three most common bird species which topped the list at the national level were the Rainbow Lorikeet, Noisy Miner and Australian Magpie. Australia Post has released a series of stamps to celebrate the tenth anniversary, you may be lucky to receive one in the mail or buy the set at the Post office.

If you want to participate in this year's Aussie Bird Count you need to register as a counter via the Aussie Bird Count website https://aussiebirdcount.org.au download the app on Apple Store or Google Play, enter your bird count location in the app and begin counting by recording the number of species over a 20 minute period, then submit your count via the app or web form.

All it requires is a sharp pair of eyes, pen and paper and a cuppa, what could be easier than that. Submit your count and be in the running to win some great prizes!

To make use of the wheelchair, you simply need to visit the Manjimup Visitor Centre team to read and complete the conditions of use and agreement form, provide identification and then you are free to explore the Heritage Park at your leisure.

Users and/or carers utilising the free service must ensure they take into consideration any special needs or limitations the user of the chair may have, as it is not fitted with a seatbelt.

This initiative was raised at the Shire of Manjimup's Access and Inclusion Advisory Committee and then a recommendation was made to Council, who approved the purchase of the wheelchair for mobility impaired visitors to utilise whilst visiting the Manjimup Heritage Park.

You are never alone. It's OK to not be OK and need help.





Be breast aware this October!



October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month so, it's an important time to shine a light on the impact that breast cancer has on many Australians. It's also important for people to get

to know common breast cancer symptoms.

are known to delay going to a medical clinic when they were experiencing symptoms, with many experiencing self-doubt about the existence of the symptom. In 2019, 1,899 women in WA were diagnosed with breast cancer, and 259 women lost their lives to it.

If you are unsure about a possible symptom, you should make an appointment to discuss the change with your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker as soon as possible. This is particularly important if it's been more than four weeks since you first noticed the change. Cancer treatments have improved in recent years, and it is much easier to successfully treat breast cancer if it is found early. The more it spreads, the harder it is to treat. So, we must Find Cancer Early.

Everyone's breasts are different. It is important that you get to know what your breasts look and feel like, so you know what is normal for you. There is no right or wrong way to check your breasts.

Common symptoms of breast cancer:

- A lump or hard area in your breast or underarm, especially if it is only on one side
- A change in the size, shape or feel of your breast
- Change in the look of your breast, including redness, rash, or your skin looks like the skin of an orange, or is wrinkling in small folds
- Changes to the nipple, like it's pulled inwards, leaking, itchy or has a sore that won't heal
- Breast pain or discomfort, especially if it is only on one side
- An area of the breast that feels different to the rest.

You can give yourself the best chance to Find Cancer Early, by going to see a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away if you have any of the symptoms above. The benefits to Finding Cancer Early is that treatment is easier, and you can be around longer to do the things you love doing with the people you love.

Breast cancer screening:

Breast cancer can also occur with no symptoms, so for Australian women 50 to 74 years NOT experiencing the symptoms above, it's important to take part in breast screening every two years with BreastScreen WA. Screening mammograms are designed for people who are NOT experiencing symptoms. Waiting to participate in screening when you have a symptom could delay your diagnosis and risk a worse outcome.

So, if you have a symptom, see your doctor.




