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BOK CHOY

Bok choy or pak choy (*Brassica rapa* subsp. *chinensis*) is a type of Chinese cabbage. It has a flavour between spinach and water chestnuts but is slightly sweeter, with a mildly peppery undertone. The green leaves have a stronger flavour than the white bulb. Bok choy and Pak choy are basically the same plant, the difference being Bok choy has a white stem and Pak choy a green stem. Bok choy evolved in China, where it has been cultivated since the 5th century AD. A member of the family of Brassicaceae or Cruciferae, also commonly known as the mustards, the crucifers, or the cabbage family. Cabbage, kale, broccoli, cauliflower, Bok choy, turnip and Brussels sprouts are all Brassicas. This huge group of delicious veggies are extremely versatile and crammed with vitamins, minerals and other health-giving properties.

As cool to mild season crops, all can be planted in autumn in WA. Bok choy needs rich soil with plenty of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. Be sure to add plenty of compost and some organic fertilizer to the soil at planting time. It grows best in full sun, but can tolerate some shade. Watch out for slugs, snails, aphids, whitefly, cabbage moth and associated caterpillars.

Bok choy contains vitamins C and E, beta-carotene, folate, and selenium. Vitamin C, vitamin E, and beta-carotene are powerful antioxidants that can help to prevent cell damage from free radicals, so you know it's good for you.

PAN FRIED BOK CHOY

Ingredients: I tablespoon peanut oil, 2 bunches Bok choy washed and quartered, 2 garlic cloves thinly sliced, 1 tablespoon honey, 2 tablespoons soy sauce, ½ teaspoon sesame oil, about 1/3 cup cashews (optional).

Method: Heat peanut oil in a large wok over high heat, add Bok Choy and stir fry for 2 minutes until just wilted, add garlic, honey and soy sauce. Stir fry until Bok choy is just tender, remove from heat, toss through sesame oil and cashews if using. A delicious side dish with marinated chicken pieces or beef skewers.

A word or two about the Orenda Ensemble: The Orenda Ensemble was created out of a shared desire to express the divine moments of musical joy and connection experienced when performing. This unique ensemble, featuring musicians Michael Howell (flute), Alix Hamilton (viola), and Adam Pinto (piano), has been exploring the possibilities within the existing repertoire of classical trios.

Michael Howell (flute): graduated from the University of Western Australia, and completed postgraduate studies at the University of Music in Weimar, Germany. He is a freelance musician and has performed throughout Germany and Switzerland and with the West Australian Symphony Orchestra, is principal flute for the West Australian Philharmonic Orchestra and Fremantle Chamber He lectures in flute at the University of Western Australia and the WA Academy of Performing Arts. Michael performs on an original flute made in 1880 by the celebrated French flute maker Louis Lot.

Alix Hamilton (viola): Since graduating with a Bachelor of Music on violin from the West Australian Academy of Performing Arts, she has focused her energies on viola, becoming a leading violist in the freelance music scene in Perth. As well as a teacher, Alix regularly performs as both a chamber and orchestral musician.

Adam Pinto (piano): Pianist, researcher and composer, Adam lectures in piano and musicology at the University of Western Australia. He performs regularly with WA Symphony Orchestra, and has been recorded for broadcast by the ABC. He is a sought after chamber musician, working with local and international soloists at festivals worldwide.



MAGIC MUSHROOMS

Famous, enchanting and highly toxic fly agaric is the home of fairies and magical creatures who live in the forest. This fungi has turned up in many fairy tales and features in the story of Alice in Wonderland when she is given some fly agaric to eat.

It was traditionally used as an insecticide. The cap was broken up and sprinkled into saucers of milk. It's known to contain ibotenic acid, which both attracts and kills flies which gives it its name.

Fly agaric (amanita muscaria) is not a native fungus. It is native to the northern hemisphere where it is found in both conifer and hardwood forests. In eastern Australia and New Zealand fly agaric is common in pine plantations where it's used purposely as a beneficial mycorrhizal partner for radiata pine trees. It has never been intentionally introduced into Western Australia but in recent years has been found in pine plantations, gardens and parks in the Perth Hills, Manjimup and Margaret River. Fly agaric is a very distinctive fungus, caps are large, up to 20cm diameter, dome shaped at first then flat, bright orange-red with white patchy scales on the surface.

If you don't have fly agaric popping up in your lawn, take a trip out to Foresters Wood. Over 100 species of trees from around the world are planted there. Some of the oldest ones were planted by the

Michelides family who pioneered Manjimup's tobacco industry and used this property as their base. Foresters Wood was established in 1985 by the Institute of Foresters Australia and is an arboretum of trees dedicated to the famous trees of commerce, culture, legend and literature.

If you see a patch of fly agaric, take a closer look, you might just spot some magical woodland creatures hiding among them, you never know!

25 Years of The Bibbulmun Track PHOTO COMPETITION AND EXHIBITION

As part of the celebrations coming up in August to mark 25 years since the Track opened, here's a word from Northcliffe CRC: "We're honouring the 25th anniversary of the Bibbulmun Track with an exhibition and photography competition at the Painted Tree Gallery in August. Organised by the Northcliffe Community Resource Centre.

Here's what you need to know:

- Enter up to 5 photos from the Bibbulmun Track over the past 25 years
- Entry deadline 1st July 2023
- Entry is free and open to everyone

(Photos preferably from the Southern Forest region of the track.)

The photos will be exhibited at Painted Tree Gallery, Northcliffe, throughout August.

A little local history regarding the track: as part of Manjimup Shire's Centenary Celebrations in 2008, six locals and a visitor walked the track from the northern Shire boundary to southern boundary, a distance of 269.3 k. The Shire bus picked up the excited walkers in Manjimup at 7 am May 17th to deliver them to their starting place, Green's Island. It was just a short walk to the first stop - One Tree Bridge where breakfast and a cheering send off group awaited. Then they were on their way. The walk took two weeks, and during that time the weather turned into typical south west winter. Rain, hail, wind. But they kept their spirits up, having an overnight stop over in Pemberton, a chance for family and friends to catch up. Rose Ferrell met with the team a few times along the track to take videos and photos. Walpole was a welcome sight for those walkers on May 31st, with a meal at the hotel and Shire representative

on hand to present them with achievement certificates, and the bus to take the tired walkers home to

Manjimup.

Also to celebrate the 25 years, the Bibbulmun Track Foundation have an end to end of the track organised, with experienced guides leading the way. If 1000 k seems a little too far, perhaps the opportunity to join the group August 18th to 22nd, for the 59 k distance Pemberton to Northcliffe, may be more appealing. A TALENTED LOCAL LADY

In past generations crocheting and knitting were always popular, providing clothing, and filling in the time before screens came on the scene. And surprisingly, it seems that since Covid lock down days these craft skills have had a new uplift of interest, which led to a chat with Malena Hayhow who does beautiful crochet.

Marlena says she started crocheting in her young days, teaching herself from an instruction book and just as she was in the early stages of learning she was asked to supply a knee length dress for someone who saw her work, and from then crocheting became a positive in her life. These days it helps manage her joint pain, cutting medication and fills in her hours, plus providing a little income.

Over the years she has regularly entered her work to Sydney, Melbourne and Perth Royal Shows and gained many first and second prizes, earning around \$700, including being selected for the Sydney Window of Excellence. At Perth's Royal Show last year she was awarded two First Prizes and one Third Prize.

Readers may have seen her at the Park Café, in her electric wheelchair, on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, offering for a

small fee to share her crochet skills. A little history of Marlena – the name Hayhow is a Scottish word meaning High Craig. She has been a Manji local for around two years, coming here from the Eastern States. Sadly, a few months after arriving her husband passed away.

Marlena is a regular at the CRC handicraft sessions on Tuesday afternoons.



GETTING TO KNOW OUR CRC STAFF


Thanks to Anne Martin, reception staff member, for sharing her story. And her artistic talents. And yes please Anne, we would like more in future.

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This month I was asked to write something about the art I do for an article in Cafe Bytes. At the moment I have a sister who is battling cancer so my thoughts are constantly of her and then of our childhood. I decided I would write something about us moving to Western Australia. I asked my sister for her memories. This month these are her memories and, if the readers would like, next month I will give my memories. Anne Martin.

Our parents decided to move from Victoria to WA in 1968. Mum's auntie had died and a house was available for us to live in Donnybrook. We loaded up dad's old Chevy Ute with our belongings, it had a canopy on the back but we were squashed in the front - Dad and Mum, my sister and me. We drove to SA and caught the train which would take the car and us to Kalgoorlie. Once we arrived in Kalgoorlie we stayed the night then started the drive to Donnybrook. We got as far as Collie and ran out of petrol! I remember sleeping in the car and it was freezing. We got going again the next morning and I remember arriving in Donnybrook where it was raining and freezing, it was April. One of the first things mum did was buy us girls an electric blanket for our beds.

My sister and I started at the school, I was in year 10 and my sister was in year 6. It was a big change from the high school in Mildura, we only had 8 girls in my class and the rest were boys. I made a good friend who still stays in contact, she said we were lucky to come to WA as we had no natural disasters here. Not long after that the Meckering earthquake happened and our whole house shook! I have fond memories of our time in Donnybrook although it took a while to settle into such a small town after living in a city.

Our aim is to source as much as possible from local Businesses.


